



Edward Gioachino Giobbi (born July 18, 1926, in <u>Waterbury, Connecticut</u>) is an American artist and <u>cookbook</u> author.

Giobbi's paintings and other renderings mostly appear in collections in Italy but also the U.S. His works have been shown in solo and group shows featuring a range from <u>abstract impressionism</u> to pop art. According to New York Times reviewer Edward Zimmer, Giobbi's early works reveal the influence of expressionism. These works depict a "dark sense of ambiguity and longing" contradicted by "buoyant" colors. "Mr. Giobbi's art then takes a different turn... more intellectual and formal", revealing the impact of cubism and formalism.

Zimmer notes Giobbi's use of a protagonist, Linus, addressing issues of loss and <u>abandonment</u>. See the article "In Katonah with Nothing But Abstractions to Consider" by Vivien Raynor, New York Times, July 19, 1992, and Giobbi's response, "The Myth of Linus in Greek Mythology" New York Times, September 16, 1992.

Giobbi's later works are autobiographical, with a "free, seemingly extemporaneous use of paint that contrasts with the deliberately plotted quality of the main compositions."










obayashi Haruo (December 21, 1925 - January 26, 2010) was a Japanese cartoonist and essayist. Jablonsky passed away in 1992 but her work continues to be widely collected, exhibited, and admired.

Born in Yamanashi Prefecture in 1925. He graduated from Kofu Industrial School in 1943. In 1954, he was recommended by Ryuichi Yokoyama, who was serializing "Fuku-chan" in the daily newspaper, and began serializing a one-frame cartoon "Hitokuchi Manga" of current affairs satire, which lasted until 1990. [1] He was a member of the manga group, and he wrote essays and manga, and studied Macintosh at the age of 70.

On January 26, 2010, he died of heart failure at a hospital in Yokohama. Died at the age of 84.

Louis Oscar Griffith (1875–1956) was an American <u>painter</u> known for his paintings, etchings, and aquatints of landscapes, especially of scenes in Brown County, Indiana, and Texas. He was born in Newcastle, Indiana in 1875, but five years later moved with his family to Dallas, Texas, where, in his teens, he took art lessons in landscape artist's <u>Frank Reaugh</u>'s studio and traveled with Reaugh and other students on sketching exhibitions in West Texas. He then studied at the <u>St. Louis School and Museum of Fine Arts</u> before moving to Chicago in the mid-1890s to study at the Art Institute and work as a commercial artist. After a one-year New York interlude in 1902-03, he returned to Chicago.

Working as an illustrator at Barnes-Crosby Engraving in Chicago, he became interested in etching. In 1908, he traveled in France and England, painting, making sketches for prints and honing his printmaking skills. One of his Brittany paintings—"The River Aven"— was part of the Art Institute's thirteenth annual exhibition of Chicago artists and appeared in the *Chicago Journal* (February 2, 1909). Griffith had joined the Palette and Chisel Club, which took sketching trips in the outdoors, and, at the suggestion of one of its members in 1907 had visited Brown County, Indiana. That visit began decades of painting and sketching those wooded hills. Eventually, in 1922, Griffith moved to Brown County with his wife (he married Carolyn Maulsby in 1920) to join the Brown County Art Colony.

During the cold Hoosier winters between 1926 and 1930, Griffith made return trips to Texas, where he had sketched his earliest landscapes under the guidance of Frank Reaugh. When Griffith's Texas landscapes were featured in a 2010 exhibit at the Tyler Museum of Art in Tyler, Texas, TMA's director, Kimberley Tomio, called the exhibition "the first exposure that scholars and collectors of early Texas art as well as the general public will have to view this powerful and beautiful body of work," said Kimberley Tomio, TMA Director.







Léonard Tsuguharu Foujita (藤田 嗣治, *Fujita Tsuguharu*; 27 November 1886 – 29 January 1968) was a Japanese-French painter. After studying Western-style painting in Japan, Foujita travelled to <u>Paris</u>, where he encountered the international modern art scene of the <u>Montparnasse</u> neighbourhood and developed an eclectic style that borrowed from both Japanese and European artistic traditions.

With his unusual fashion and distinctive figurative style, Foujita reached the height of his fame in 1920s Paris. His watercolour and oil works of nudes, <u>still lifes</u>, and self-portraits were a commercial success and he became a notable figure in the Parisian art scene.

Foujita spent three years travelling through South and North America before returning to Japan in 1933, documenting his observations in sketches and paintings. Upon his return home, Foujita became an official war artist during World War II, illustrating battle scenes to raise the morale of the Japanese troops and citizens. His oil paintings won him acclaim during the war, but public perception of him became mixed following the Japanese defeat.

Without significant prospects in the post-war Japanese art scene, Foujita returned to France in 1950, where he would spend the rest of his life. He received French nationality in 1955 and converted to <u>Catholicism</u> in 1959. His latter years were spent working on the frescoes for a small, Romanesque chapel in Reims that he had constructed. He died in 1968, shortly after the chapel officially opened.

In France, Foujita is remembered as part of the <u>années folles</u> of the 1920s, but public opinion of him in Japan remains mixed due to his monumental depictions of the war. Retrospective exhibitions organised since 2006 in Japan have sought to establish Foujita's place in Japanese twentieth-century art history.





In 1988, he relocated to the San Francisco Bay Area.


Since 1985, he has been engaged in professional painting and printmaking, and his work has been regularly exhibited in the United States, Japan, and Europe.



Leonor Fini (1907–1996) was a celebrated Argentine Italian artist known for her distinctive Surrealist-inspired paintings, illustrations, and costume designs, which often featured powerful, mystical, and erotic imagery rooted in mythology and the subconscious. Born in Buenos Aires, her early life was marked by a custody battle that forced her and her mother to flee to Italy. This dramatic event may have influenced the dreamlike and enigmatic qualities that later emerged in her art. In Italy, Fini honed her artistic skills in Trieste and Milan. By the mid-1930s, she had established herself in Paris, a vibrant center for Surrealism. Her paintings quickly gained recognition for their captivating qualities. Fini's work explored the depths of the subconscious through symbolism, often featuring powerful, mysterious women and fantastical creatures rendered in vibrant colors. These elements, along with her masterful use of light and shadow, created enigmatic compositions that invited viewers on a journey of personal interpretation. Despite never formally joining the Surrealist movement, she became a central figure in the Paris art scene, celebrated for her independence, wit, and unconventional lifestyle, and her work is held in major collections worldwide, including the Tate Modern and The Met Museum. Fini's work gained significant recognition after her death and is featured in important museum collections. She is considered a pioneering female artist who provided a unique perspective on the themes explored by the Surrealists, challenging traditional portrayals of women in art.

Meta Pluckebaum (1876–1954) was born in Dortmund and studied art with Hermann Pohle and later with her husband Karl. Pluckebaum became a prolific painter and illustrator of cats, she is best known for her sensitive, fine drypoint etchings of cats (as well as dogs and other animals) Most of her paintings and etchings of cats are of kittens and are reminiscent of the style of Henriette Ronner-Knip and Julius Adam of the 19th century. Her kittens are cute and are always up to mischief

Brenda King was born in Cumbria in 1934. She studied at Lancaster College of Art from 1950 to 1954 and at the Royal College of Art from 1954 to 1957 and exhibited regularly at the Royal Academy Summer Exhibition whilst living near London. In the 1960s and 70s she had regular shows in the South East before moving to Cornwall in 1975. She lived in Penzance with her husband, Jeremy, who is also a successful artist. Very sadly Brenda died in July 2011.

Brenda's paintings are in the faux-native style that found many followers in the late twentieth century in West Cornwall. The composition of a table-top with crockery in front of window looking out on a coastal scene echoes a famous painting by Ben Nicholson in the 1940s. Her style was strongly influenced by the Bristol-born artist Mary Fedden OBE.

Brenda's paintings have been exhibited widely in recent years, across the West Country as well as internationally, as far afield as Tokyo. She has retained a strong following of collectors.

Annapia Antonini was born in 1942 in Lugano Switzerland. After studying art in Switzerland she moved to Paris in 1962 and studied painting at L'Academie Julian and etching at Friedlaender's atelier.

Her first exhibition was held in 1964 in Switzerland, her second in Sweden in 1966, a third in 1967 at Le Bateau-Lavoir and in 1969 at Galerie Kieffer in Paris. Since then she has exhibited regularly throughout Europe and also in Japan and the USA. Her work is in many public and private collections.

Anthony Dawson writes of her work: "The poetic quality of Annapia Antonini's work has always appealed to me since I first discovered it. It is the poetry of everyday things used in a particuarly observant way - a dish of vegetables, a plate of fish, a few chairs - arranged in apparently random fashion. But in fact however ordinary the objects we find in her work their presence there and their arrangement in the composition are far from accidental. There is always a deliberate choice: the mundane object is placed in a way which opens our eyes to its less tangible qualities distilling for us the beauty of simple things and showing how they relate to us. The technique and the years of hard work which enable Annapia to express herself with such assurance never obtrude but as with all true artists there is a mastery of the medium which may seduce the senses but never leaves us in doubt that she knows exactly where she is going. The statement is direct but avoids being harsh; and yet the subtlety of colouring and the gentle expressiveness of line never cloy. We end up feeling that if we had ever been clever enough to think of the ideal way to immortalise a kitchen table or a child's toy this is exactly how we would have done it."



Kasukabe Tatsuu (real name: Tatsuu Kasukabe) May 26, 1903 - 16 September 1985) is a Japanese watercolor painter. He is one of the founders of the Watercolor Federation.

Born in Takanomura, Kita-Aizu-gun, Fukushima Prefecture (present-day Aizu Wakamatsu City) His real father, Kasukabe Harunori (Kasukabe Kazeho), was a judge and a poet.

He graduated from Aizu Junior High School (present) Fukushima Prefectural. He went to Tokyo in 1924 and studied at the Western Art Department of Kawabata School of Painting. In 1928, the watercolor exhibition was selected. In 1929, his watercolor "Lake and Mountain" was selected for the 10th National Art Exhibition and became a member of the Japan Watercolor Society. In 1940, seven comrades, including Shigeru Komuro and Naosuke Arai, founded the "Watercolor League." Since then, he stopped exhibiting in official exhibitions and at the Japan Watercolor Society, and continued to exhibit at the Watercolor Federation and solo exhibitions after the war.

His style was that of a landscape painter, characterized by bright colors and a tasteful painting.



Takao lijima (born May 19, 1931), better known by his <u>art name</u> **Ay-O** (靉嘔 $Ai \, \bar{O}$), ^[1] is a Japanese avant-garde visual and performance artist who has been associated with <u>Fluxus</u> since its international beginnings in the 1960s.

One of his projects in the west was a Collective Portrait of George Maciuanas, that he coedited with Emmett Williams and Ann Noel. In the recent decade Ay-O has exhibited regularly at the Emily Harvey Gallery in (1996, 2001) and Gallery Itsutsuji (1996, 2005, 2007,2012) and Gallery Goto (1999, 2004) in Japan. In Japan Ay-O is part of the collection of the National Museum of Modern Art in Tokyo and Kyoto (see 2005 Tokyo exhibition in the links). In 2001 Ay-O had a room in the special exhibit "La fluxus Constellation" in the Museum of Contemporary Art in Genoa. He was also represented in various other Fluxus exhibitions around the world as "Centraal Fluxus Festival" Centraal Museum, Utrecht (2003), "Fluxus & Non Fluxus Fluxus" Randers kunstmuseum (2006). Being present at both the Venice Biennale in 1966 and at the São Paulo Biennale in 1971, Ay-O was one of the "Twelve Japanese Artists from the Venice Biennale 1952-2001," in Art Tower Mito ATM, Mito. At the Mori Art Museum, Tokyo, Ay-O was part of two exhibitions: "Tokyo-Berlin / Berlin-Tokyo" in 2005 and "All about laughter" in 2007. The MoMA also has several posts about Ay-O: One about his return to Tokyo in 1966 after 8 years in NY, a few about Japanese contributions to the Fluxus movement, or more generally Fluxus where Ay-O is present.

1986 he graduated with a bachelor's degree from the Central Academy of Arts and Crafts (now Tsinghua University School of Art), and 1998 graduated with a master's degree from Keihua University in Kyoto, Japan.

In 2007, he graduated with a postdoctoral program at Sophia University Kyoto, Japan Doctor of Arts degree.

Judith Bledsoe, American (1938 – 2013), The high-spirited daughter of a classical violinist, she grew up in California brimming with ideas. 





Boris Baranovic (Croatian/American, 1929-2016)

Boris "Bailo" Baranovic was born September 24, 1929 in Šibenik in Dalmacija on the coast of Croatia, which was then part of Yugoslavia. He identified as "BB" for Boris Bailo (a nickname he used) or Boris Baranovic. He graduated from high school in Šibenik in 1949, then left for college in Croatia's capital, Zagreb. He studied philosophy and art history at the University of Zagreb, graduating in 1952. In September of that year he went on a student excursion to Italy and decided to defect to the West. He ended up in Naples, Italy in a center for defectors and started taking courses in theatrical arts and art history.

A small exhibition of work for a display at the American Consulate serendipitously led to an honors scholarship to Amherst College. The Amherst Kirby Theater Masquers and the Glee Club became his family from 1956 to 1958. Boris graduated from Amherst with a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1958 and then earned a Master of Fine Arts degree at Yale University. After graduating in 1961, he started teaching theatrical arts at Buffalo University and worked as a stage and costume designer.

Baranovic was a prolific etcher. He etched over 100 plates in the 1970s and 80s. While there are numerous pieces depicting city scenes, seashells, cats and buildings, his focus was mostly on works relating to costume and set design for which he was most noted.







Mario Prassinos (French, 1916-1985)



Mario Prassinos (30 July 1916 – 23 October 1985) was a French modernist painter, printmaker, illustrator, stage designer, and writer of Greek-Italian descent.

Prassinos was born in <u>Istanbul</u>, <u>Ottoman Empire</u> (now <u>Turkey</u>) in 1916, the son of Victorine and Lysandre Prassinos. In 1922, at the age of six, he immigrated to France with his family, who had escaped the brutal <u>persecution of Greeks</u> and other ethnic minorities by the <u>Ottoman</u> government. Prassinos became a naturalized French citizen in 1949.

He attended the <u>Sorbonne</u> in Paris beginning in 1932 and briefly trained in the studio of the French painter Clement Serveau (1886–1972).

Through his father's literary interests Prassinos became acquainted with <u>Surrealism</u>, meeting <u>Paul Eluard</u>, <u>André Breton</u>, <u>Salvador Dalí</u>, <u>Man Ray</u>. <u>Max Ernst</u>, <u>Marcel Duchamp</u> and others in 1934, and decided to become an artist. From 1932 to 1936 he worked in a <u>Surrealist</u> style, introducing procedures of <u>automatism</u> and formal ambiguities that he retained in his later work.

During the period 1942 to 1950 he met <u>Raymond Queneau</u> and <u>Albert Camus</u> and produced work for <u>Editions Gallimard</u>.

Prassinos' work is found in major art museums in Europe and North America, including the Stedelijk Museum, Amsterdam; Musée National d'Art Moderne, Paris; Kunsthalle Bremen, Germany; Victoria and Albert Museum, London; Museum of Modern Art, New York; Museum of Chicago, and others.

Prassinos died at his home in <u>Eygalières</u>, France, on 23 October 1985. After his death, a donation of 800 of the artist's works was made to the French state. The "Donation Mario Prassinos" collection is housed in the Chapel of Notre-Dame de Pitié (also called Notre-Dame des Sept Douleurs) in <u>Saint Remy de Provence</u>, France.

Pierre Laprade, is a **french painter** born in 1875 in Narbonne, France and who died in 1931 in Fontenay-aux-Roses, France. The son of the public prosecutor Raymond Coffinhal-Laprade, Pierre Laprade attended Antoine Bourdelle's studio from 1896 onwards and, although he was destined to be a magistrate, the sculptor encouraged him in his artistic path. Pierre Laprade belonged to the post-impressionism art style. He mainly worked during the modern period in the 20 century.

Pierre Laprade is known for Figure, genre landscape painting.

He entered the École des Beaux-Arts in Paris but did not stay there, preferring to work alone. In 1900, Ambroise Vollard bought his first work. He had good basic training, first at the Ecole des Beaux-Arts at Montauban and later at the Académie Carrière in Paris. He exhibited first at the Salon des Indépendants in 1901 and later showed his work regularly at the Salon d'Automne and at the Salon des Tuileries and had a private exhibition at Ambroise Vollard. He worked with the ceramist André Metthey (1871-1920) and drew lithographs for an edition of Manon Lescaut by Eugène Druet.

That same year, at the Eugène Carrière Academy, Laprade met Henri Matisse and the future Fauves, with whom he exhibited in 1905 at the Salon d'automne.

Graciela Rodo Boulanger, (Bolivian/French, 1935 –)

Born in La Paz, Bolivia, in 1935, Rodo Boulanger creates joyful scenes that depict the pleasure of childhood in a childlike way. Her simplistic, graceful lines and lyrical colors, make her compositions as rhythmic, rigorous and spontaneous as the round-faced children she paints.

Raised in an artistic environment, Rodo Boulanger studied both piano and art as a child. At 22, she decided she must choose one or the other and began to devote all her attention to her art. Four years later, her pursuit of her art took her to Paris, where she still resides. In 1966, Rodo Boulanger's creative efforts began to be recognized with the publication of her first edition of engravings and her first exhibit in the United States.

Since then her work has been shown in more than 150 exhibitions on five continents. In 1979, she was designated by UNICEF as official artist for the International Year of the Child poster and two of her tapestries were presented in the public hall of the U.N. General Assembly that year.

Rodo Boulanger also has been recognized by The Museum of Modern Art of Latin America in Washington, DC; the Metropolitan Opera of New York; the World Federation of the United Nations Associations; The Bibliotheque Nationale, Paris; the Museum of Modern Art, LaPaz; and the Modern Art Center, Zurich.







John William Joseph Winkler, Painter, printmaker, draftsman and craftsman.

John William Joseph Winkler was born in Vienna, Austria on July 30, 1894. His family was of old money and military lineage and there appears to have been an expectation for Winkler to become a part of the Viennese government. When it became clear that young Winkler was bent on seeing America before settling down to such a future (claiming to have had "visions" of the Wild West), they agreed to fund one year's worth of travel to the United States. Documents written by Winkler state that he arrived in New York at the age of 16-1/2 and, according to *Master of Line* (Millmer, Mary and Bohn, Dave. Capra Press, 1994), he had enrolled in the Mark Hopkins Institute - now the San Francisco Art Instute - in San Francisco, California by November 1, 1912. Winkler would never return to Austria nor see his family again.



Frank Huntington Stack (American, 1937-)



Frank Huntington Stack (born October 31, 1937, in Houston, Texas)^[2] is an American underground cartoonist and artist. Working under the name Foolbert Sturgeon to avoid persecution for his work while living in the Bible Belt, Stack published what is considered by many to be the first underground comic, *The Adventures of Jesus*, in 1964. [3][4]

Stack's main artistic influences were <u>Gustave Doré</u>, <u>Roy Crane</u>, and <u>V. T. Hamlin</u>. He is widely known as a <u>printmaker</u>, specializing in <u>etchings</u> and <u>lithographs</u>, and his sketchy comics style evokes Stack's background as an etcher. (His technique of creating etchings on-site was featured in <u>American Artist</u> magazine.) His oil paintings and watercolors mostly feature landscape and figure compositions. He lives in <u>Columbia</u>, <u>Missouri</u>, where he was a longtime professor at the <u>University of Missouri</u>.



Riva Helfond (Barrett) (American, 1910-2002)

Riva Helfond (March 8, 1910 – May 13, 2002) was an American artist and printmaker best known for her <u>social realist</u> studies of working people's lives.

Riva Helfond was born in <u>Brooklyn</u>, <u>New York</u>, to a Jewish family. She spent some of her childhood in Russia and returned to New York at the age of eleven, living in New York or New Jersey for most of the rest of her life. Between 1928 and 1940, she studied at the School of Industrial Art and the Art Students League; her teachers included <u>William von Schlegell</u>, <u>Yasuo Kuniyoshi</u>, and <u>Morris Kantor</u> for painting and <u>Harry Sternberg</u> for printmaking. Among her fellow students were <u>Alexander Brook</u> and her future husband, the sculptor William (Bill) Barrett (d. 1967).
